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


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

Kevin M. Carroll, MS, CP, FAAOP
Vice President of Prosthetics



Kevin Carroll, MS, CP, FAAOP is an accomplished healthcare professional with over 30 years as a practicing prosthetist, visionary researcher, and skilled educator. As Vice President of Prosthetics for Hanger Clinic, Carroll travels nationally and internationally presenting scientific symposiums and managing clinics for difficult prosthetic cases. Carroll is the co-developer of the patented Hanger ComfortFlex™ Socket System; a bone and muscle contoured socket that revolutionized socket design and comfort. He has appeared on news broadcasts such as *Dateline*, *20/20*, *CBS Early Show*, *NBC Nightly News*, *ABC's Good Morning America*, and the *Discovery Channel*.

When not caring for his human patients (he specializes in the care of older adults and has a degree in gerontology), Carroll volunteers weekends to the Clearwater Marine Aquarium where he works with a young amputee dolphin named Winter. Carroll developed the world's first prosthetic tail that replaces the entire tail fluke of a dolphin. The real life survival story of Winter and Carroll's innovative prosthetic tail design came alive on the silver screen on September 23, 2011 in a 3D feature film starring Morgan Freeman, Ashley Judd, Kris Kristopherson, and Harry Connick, Jr.

Carroll is an American Board Certified Prosthetist and was named a Fellow of the American Academy of Orthotics and Prosthetics, one of the highest honors of the profession. He is a member of the International Society for Prosthetics and Orthotics, a professional advisor for the Amputee Coalition, a member of the National Association of Professional Geriatric Care Managers, and a member of the British Association of Prosthetics and Orthotics (BAPO).

This workshop will provide a broad overview of various topics that involve fundamental pre-award activities in sponsored projects administration, designed for anyone new to research administration or for those who just need a refresher. This session will cover the many diverse responsibilities of pre-award administration, including rules, regulations and agreements; research integrity; electronic research administration; office models and organization; proposal development, review and submission; and more. Participants in this workshop will develop a comprehensive understanding of the various services, functions, policies, regulations, and best practices in pre-award, as well as a concept of the importance of strong pre-award administration in the overall structure of research administration.

What do the sponsors review and what other institutions are looking for? How are other institutions changing their practices to keep pace with changes in the many regulations? Participants will apply the foundational principles of the OMB Circulars, federal regulations, program announcements and common institutional policies and procedures to work through the many shades of grey that make up pre-award administration. WS5: Managing the PUI Enterprise from Soup to Nuts: Overview and Best Practices

Research administrators at PUIs encounter expectations that are often unrealistic, from knowing every funding source for every discipline, to knowing about and handling every compliance regulation ever written, to fail-proof methods for increasing grants submissions, to developing faculty grant writing skills, to being a budget whiz, and, among other position-specific skills, to knowing everything about how all the other offices at our institutions operate. Uniform Guidance: Major Changes to Federal Cost Principles

OMB recently issued the most far-reaching reform of Federal grant rules in history. The new policy consolidates the OMB circulars on cost principles, administrative requirements and non-Federal audits and makes major changes to the Federal rules in these areas. This session will review the major changes to the cost principles for educational institutions and nonprofit organizations, currently in Circulars A-21 and A-122. The session will address the main changes to the rules on direct charges; the policies on the calculation of Facilities and Administrative (F&A/indirect) cost rates; and the application of Cost Accounting Standards and Disclosure Statement requirements to educational institutions.

Responding to the NIH Subaccounting Challenge in our Ever-Changing World

The Faculty Writing Workshop Model: Growing Your Department's Scholarly Capacity

Content Level: Advanced

Track: Departmental

This session will present and discuss an overview, design, and implementation of a new initiative -- the Faculty Writing Workshop -- led by a senior staff member in the school/department's office dedicated to scholarly and research development. The Faculty Writing Workshop developed in May 2013 at Columbia University School of Nursing is based upon a collaborative, supportive learning environment where 6 faculty members present manuscripts for "peer-review" by others members of the group just prior to submission to a professional journal. Manuscript strengths and weaknesses are discussed, providing the author with guidance for revisions, ultimately leading to a stronger piece of writing with a higher likelihood of publication as well as modeling techniques for writers to become more effective revisionists of their own writing. The Writing Workshop has truly become a "value-added" resource to scholarly and research-oriented faculty members, already garnering repeat participants, and has recently been expanded into the nursing student PhD and DNP curriculum. This model can be adapted to faculty writing workshops focusing on grant preparation, leading to clearer, strong grant applications and overall increased funding rates.

Measuring Success of Externally-Funded Programs at PUIs


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FLOORPLAN
